April History

Date

1 April 1921.

Title

First AIF disbanded.

Event

During the four years of the First World War the First AIF gained a reputation for military prowess that remains very much in the consciousness of Australians to the present day.

Date

3 April 1885.

Title

Tamai.

Event

Tamai was the largest and most significant engagement in which the 770-man New South Wales contingent to the Sudan were involved. In comparison with the British units involved in the battle, Australian involvement was minimal.

Date

4 April 1951.

Title

First action at Villers-Bretonneux.

Event

Villers-Bretonneux, overlooking the Somme and within artillery range of Amiens, was a principal objective when the German Spring Offensive was in its dying stages in early April. They were repulsed by the 9th Brigade from the 3rd Australian Division and some British units.

5 April 1951.

Title

3rd Battalion, Royal Australian Regiment, involved in Operation Rugged, Korea.

Event

Operation Rugged involved United Nations forces crossing the 38th Parallel and occupying strong defensive positions formed by a line of hills codenamed the Kansas Line and including Hills Salmon, Cod and Sardine, 45 kilometres north of Seoul.

Date

6 April 1942.

Title

US 41st Division arrives in Australia.

Event

Between December 1941 and August 1945 some one million Americans were stationed in Australia.

Date

6 April 1952.

Title

1st Battalion, Royal Australian Regiment, arrives in Korea.

Event

The battalion remained in Korea until September 1953.

<u>Date</u>

7 April 1916.

<u>Title</u>

Australians reach the Western Front.

Event

First Australian units of the 2nd Division arrived on Western Front and were introduced to fighting on the Western Front in what was called the 'nursery sector' in the relatively quiet area around Armentieres, France.

8 April 1918.

Title

Repatriation Department established.

Event

Once soldiers were demobilised all tasks aimed at their rehabilitation and return to civilian life became the responsibility of the Repatriation Department.

Date

9 April 1942.

Title

HMAS Vampire sunk.

Event

The destroyer HMAS Vampire and the aircraft carrier HMS Hermes were sunk by Japanese bombers off Colombo in the Bay of Bengal.

Date

9 April 1968.

Title

HMAS Sydney arrived at Vung Tau.

Event

The 1st Battalion, Royal Australian Regiment, disembarked and the 7th Battalion, Royal Australian Regiment, embarked. Sydney made 24 voyages to Vietnam during the war.

Date

10 April 1941.

Title

6th Division engage the Germans in Greece.

Event

The Greek campaign, involving forces from Greece, Britain, New Zealand, and Australia, resulted in heavy losses to the 6th Australian Division and ultimately an evacuation of Allied forces from beaches in southern Greece.

10 April 1941.

Title

Siege of Tobruk, Libya, begins.

Event

Tobruk was surrounded on three sides by the German Afrika Korps in April and remained besieged, but able to be re-supplied by sea, until December. Most Australians, however, left Tobruk between August and October.

Date

11 April 1917.

Title

First battle of Bullecourt, Western Front.

Event

The 4th Australian Division and 62nd British Division attempted to penetrate the Hindenburg Line at Bullecourt where they were unsuccessfully supported by tanks. Over 1,000 Australians became prisoners of war, the largest number in a single action in the First World War. 3,000 became casualties.

Date

11 April 1951.

Title

General MacArthur dismissed from command in Korea.

Event

MacArthur was dismissed from his command in Korea for the perception in Washington that he was too intemperate and likely to escalate the war.

<u>Date</u>

11 April 1970.

Title

HMAS Vendetta returns to Sydney.

Event

HMAS Vendetta was the only one of three Australian Daring class destroyers to serve on the gunline in Vietnamese waters. The ship served one tour.

12 April 1918.

Title

Battle of Hazebrouck, Western Front.

Event

Hazebrouck, a crucial rail centre, 30 kilometres west of Armentieres, was threatened by the German offensive on the Lys. The 1st Australian Division repelled several heavy German attacks.

Date

12 April 1941.

Title

ANZAC Corps reformed in Greece by General Blamey.

Event

Australian and New Zealand troops fought alongside soldiers from Greece and Britain in the ill-fated Greek campaign. Blamey, however, conducted a skillful evacuation of the ANZAC Corps from southern Greece at the end of the campaign.

Date

13 April 1916.

<u>Title</u>

Jifjaffa.

Event

A squadron of the 9th Light Horse Regiment captured this Turkish outpost in the Sinai, about 60 kilometres from the Suez. The encounter, the first engagement for the Light Horse in the Sinai, demonstrated their potential for fighting in the Middle East.

Date

13 April 1983.

Title

Dedication of the Rats of Tobruk memorial.

Event

The memorial, on Anzac Parade, was dedicated by the Governor-General of Australia, the Right Hon Sir Ninian Stephen. The memorial commemorates the Australian and Allied servicemen who died during the siege of Tobruk in 1941.

14 April 1941.

Title

Second attack against Tobruk by Afrika Korps fails.

Event

The besieged town of Tobruk held out against German attacks until December 1941 when the siege was lifted.

Date

17 April 1917.

Title

Second battle of Gaza.

Event

A second attack on the Turkish coastal stronghold at Gaza. Reinforced and prepared for an attack, the Turks repulsed General Sir Archibald Murray's assault, inflicting over 6,000 casualties on the attackers.

<u>Date</u>

18 April 1941.

Title

Tempe (or Pinios) Gorge, Greece.

Event

The 2/2nd and 2/3rd Battalions, AIF, and New Zealand's 21st Battalion stemmed a German advance in a rearguard action that enabled the main Allied force in Greece to establish a new defensive line across the Thermopylae peninsula.

Date

18 April 1942.

Event

General Thomas Blamey appointed to command Allied land forces in the South-West Pacific Area.

18 April 1943.

Title

Admiral Yamamoto, Imperial Japanese Navy, killed.

Event

American Intelligence decoded signals that provided the timetable for Yamamoto's flight. His aircraft was intercepted and shot down near Bougainville by American Lightnings from Guadalcanal. Yamamoto, Commander of the Japanese Combined Fleet, was the architect of the attack on Pearl Harbor.

Date

19 April 1968.

Title

Dedication of the Desert Mounted Corps memorial.

Event

The memorial, on Anzac Parade, was dedicated by Prime Minister John Gorton. The memorial is based on the original unveiled at Port Said, Egypt, by former Prime Minister William Morris Hughes in 1932. It was destroyed during the Suez Crisis of 1956.

Date

20 April 1915.

<u>Title</u>

First half-flight, Australian Flying Corps, sailed for the Baghdad expedition.

Event

This was the first use of Australian aircraft and aircrew in war.

<u>Date</u>

20 April 1941.

Title

ANZAC Corps withdraw to Thermopylae Line, Greece.

Event

The Greek campaign ended in disaster for the Allies. Unable to hold out against numerically stronger and better organised German forces, the Allies were forced to evacuate their troops from Greece in late April 1941.

21 April 1917.

Title

Foundation of the Imperial War Graves Commission.

Event

The Imperial War Graves Commission was later renamed the Commonwealth War Graves Commission. It is responsible for erecting and maintaining war memorials and cemeteries.

Date

22 April 1941.

Title

Evacuation of Greece begins.

Event

The evacuation marked the end of the ill-conceived Greek campaign which lasted only three weeks.

Date

23 April 1918.

Title

Ostend and Zeebruge, Belgium, raided.

Event

Eleven volunteers from HMAS Australia took part in a raid that aimed to prevent the Germans using these Belgian ports as a bases for their submarines.

Date

23 April 1951.

Title

Battle of Kapyong, Korea.

Event

The most well-known Australian action of the Korean War, Kapyong involved the 3rd Battalion, Royal Australian Regiment (3RAR). The fighting at Kapyong blunted the Chinese advance on Seoul during the 1951 Spring Offensive and prevented a Communist breakthrough on the United Nations central front. 3RAR was awarded a United States Presidential citation for their part in the battle.

24 -25 April 1918.

Title

Second battle of Villers-Bretonneux, Western Front.

Event

When the Germans captured the town that had been the centre of fighting just three weeks previously, Australian and British troops drove them out in a daring night attack at a cost of 1,469 casualties.

Date

25 April 1901.

Title

Naval contingent return to Sydney from China.

Event

Sailors from New South Wales, South Australia and Victoria were sent to China to assist in quelling an anti-western rebellion by Chinese secret societies. Although it arrived too late to see any significant fighting, the Australian colonial force suffered six fatalities, none from combat.

Date

25 April 1915.

Title

Landings at Gallipoli.

Event

British, French, Australian and New Zealand troops were involved in a series of coordinated landings. Although the Gallipoli campaign was a military failure, the anniversary of the landing has become a national day of commemoration in Australia.

Date

25 April 1916.

Title

First commemoration of Anzac Day.

Event

The first anniversary of the Gallipoli landings was widely observed in Australia. Large crowds attended church services and public ceremonies. The day was also commemorated by Australian and New Zealand servicemen in Egypt and London.

25 April 1916.

Title

First commemoration of Anzac Day.

Event

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Date

26 April 1944.

Title

Alexishafen occupied.

Event

Alexishafen, New Guinea, was occupied by Australian troops.

Date

26 April 1953.

Title

Ceasefire talks resume in Panmunjong.

Event

Warring sides try to bring an end to the fighting in Korea.

Date

28 April 1952.

Title

Australia ratifies peace treaty with Japan and official ending of the British Commonwealth Occupation Force (BCOF).

Event

From the end of 1948 Australia had taken on the largest role in BCOF. When the state of occupation ended the Commonwealth organisation in Japan was redesignated British Commonwealth Forces Korea and continued supplying and administering Commonwealth forces then fighting in Korea.

29 April 1915.

Title

HMA Submarine AE2 sunk in the Sea of Marmara.

Event

AE2 was the first submarine to penetrate the Dardanelles. For five days the AE2 carried out orders to disrupt Turkish shipping. When her torpedoes were exhausted and she was attacked by Turkish gunboats the submarine was scuttled and her crew captured.

Date

29 April 1965.

Title

Prime Minister Menzies announces the commitment of an infantry battalion to Vietnam.

Event

Australia's involvement in Vietnam was a gradual process. By April 1965 there were 100 members of the Australian Army Training Team Vietnam in Vietnam. The commitment of a battalion represented a major step in Australia's involvement and precipitated further increases in the number of Australians serving in Vietnam until reductions began in 1970.

Date

30 April 1941.

<u>Title</u>

Last evacuation ship leaves Greece.

Event

Australian and New Zealand troops fought alongside soldiers from Greece and Britain in the ill-fated Greek campaign. General Blamey conducted a skillful evacuation of the ANZAC Corps from southern Greece at the end of the campaign.

PRIVATE GODFREY, FINALLY EXCUSED FROM DUTY

On this day, 12 March 1984, actor Arnold Ridley passed away. He was best known for playing Private Godfrey in Dad's Army (1968-1977).

What perhaps many people don't know is that he was also a soldier in real life sustaining several bad wounds during WW1 as a Private with the Somerset Light Infantry Regiment.

His left hand was incapacitated by a bayonet on the Somme, and his legs were riddled with shrapnel. Hand to hand combat with a German soldier resulted in a blow to his head from a rifle butt that left him prone to blackouts, and another bayonet wound in his groin.

During WW2 he was in the Intelligence Corps, and when he was discharged on medical grounds he joined the Home Guard and the Entertainments National Service Organisation, which toured the camps entertaining the troops.

His body was cremated at the Golders Green Crematorium and an urn holding his ashes was buried in his parents' grave at Bath Abbey Cemetery. He was born on 7 January 1896 in Bath, Somerset.

There has been some confusion over the years as to whether Arnold Ridley won the Military Medal or not. In an episode of Dad's Army, a picture of Charles Godfrey wearing the MM is seen, but the actor himself never received one.

He was, according to conversations between Arnold and his son Nicolas, recommended for the Distinguished Conduct Medal.

"A horrible irony is that my father was not the sort of man who was out for official recognition, yet all he had ever wanted was the Military Medal. He told me that when he came back from No Man's Land after an attack on the Somme, he was standing around with four or five other boys when an officer spoke to them. He said he was going to put them all up for the MM except for my father who, because he had a lance corporal stripe on, he would put up for the Distinguished Conduct Medal. All the other men got their MMs but he didn't get the DCM, and that did embitter him a little bit. It is exactly the sort of thing he would not have normally cared about, but I think he felt it was a badge of comradeship. When he was awarded an OBE for playing a small comedy part in a television series, I felt it was a poor reward for someone who had served in two world wars."
